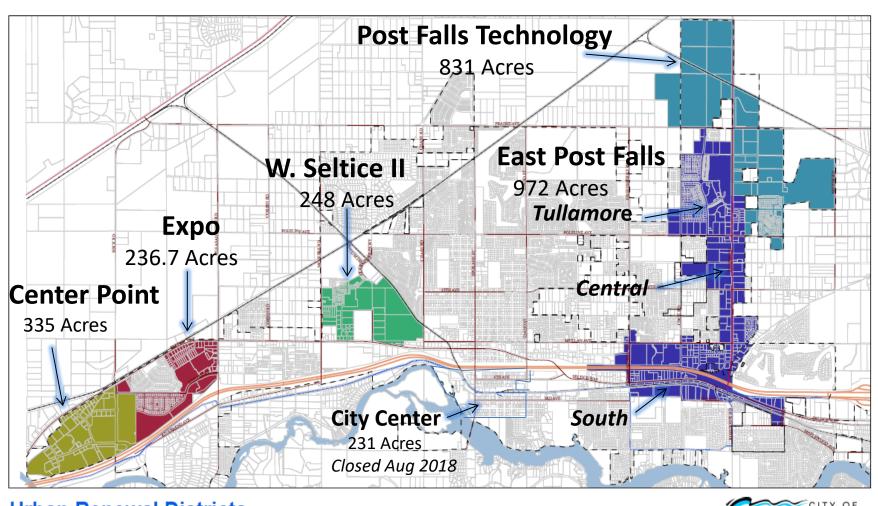

Current Urban Renewal Districts

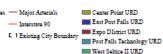


Urban Renewal Districts

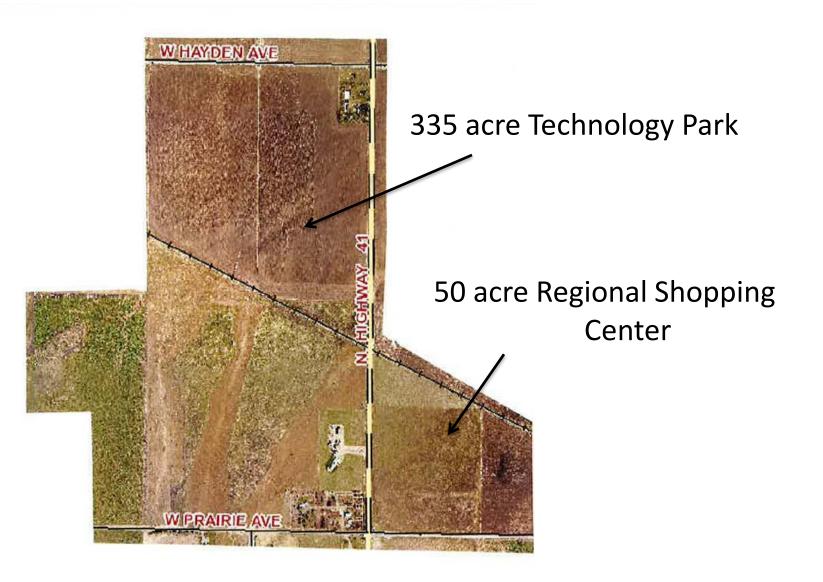

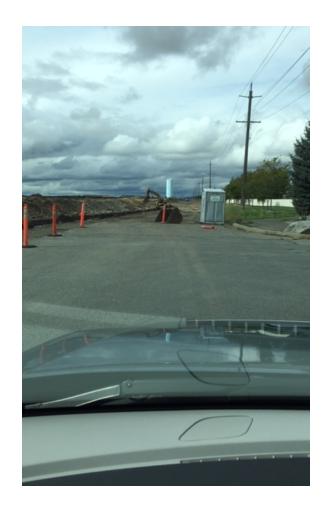


Light poles were installed. Curb, sidewalk, paving and landscaping will take place this spring.

Closing Comments

- The Agency closed its 3rd URD (City Center) in August 2018 with a \$448,000 surplus rebate issued to the taxing entities. The closure resulted in \$21,903,395 in "New Development" which taxing districts had the opportunity to include in their FY 2019 budget.
- The new Post Falls Technology District Plan was adopted in October, 2018 with a 20 year life, maturing in 2038.
- Eric Clemensen was appointed to replace Rich Houser on the PFURA board and Jerry Baltzell and Len Crosby were re-appointed to serve for additional 5 year terms.
